

Park Avenue Armory Announces 2025 Season Featuring Bold, Multidisciplinary World and North American Premieres from the Vanguard of Contemporary Music, Visual Art, and Experimental Performance

- British musician, DJ, and producer **Jamie xx** launches the North American tour for his latest critically acclaimed release, *In Waves*, taking over the Wade Thompson Drill Hall for four back-to-back nights
- The largest installation to date in North America of cultural icon **Yoko Ono**'s ongoing work *Wish Tree*, a grove of 92 trees installed in the Drill Hall in celebration of the influential artist's 92nd birthday, inviting visitors to write and attach personal wishes
- The world premiere of *DOOM*, cross-disciplinary artist **Anne Imhof**'s large-scale, durational performance
 piece curated by **Klaus Biesenbach**, which will take over the Armory with performers, sound, and
 scenography in an exploration of the balance between apathy, activism, and resistance
- The North American premiere of *Constellation*, an exhibition of more than 450 prints by revolutionary photographer **Diane Arbus**—many of them still unpublished—in the most comprehensive assemblage of her work to date, capturing the breadth of life in postwar America and offering new perspectives on her subjects

New York, NY—November 18, 2024—Park Avenue Armory today announced its 2025 season that features bold, transformative artistic experiences from Jamie xx, Yoko Ono, Anne Imhof, Diane Arbus, Trajal Harrell, and more that subvert and expand expectations of what contemporary music, visual art, and performance can be. Comprised predominantly of world and North American premieres, the 2025 season builds on the Armory's history of presenting masterpieces in spatial music, site-specific concert experiences, genre-defying theatrical works, and elevating singular artistic perspectives from across the world. In the expansive Wade Thompson Drill Hall, these productions will engage with the Armory's iconic architecture in unexpected ways, offering unique settings for audiences to experience music, photography, and performance. The historic period rooms will host intimate Recital Series performances and Artists Studio programs curated by Jason Moran, showcasing the talents of visionary artists across genres. These programs will be complemented by Making Space at the Armory, a series of talks and symposia.

"This season's Drill Hall programs encompass a thrilling spectrum of settings and moods that capture the complexity of our current moment," said Pierre Audi, the Anita K. Hersh Artistic Director of Park Avenue Armory. "We will explore a range of performance styles that reimagine traditions of pageantry and storytelling, from a large-scale performance commission by the fearless Anne Imhof, to Trajal Harrell's fashion- and freedom-forward catwalk, to a musical staging of the revolutionary idealism of the 1970s. We are also celebrating the legacies of Diane Arbus and Yoko Ono, and welcoming two incredible musical innovators back to the Armory—Jamie xx and Georg Friedrich Haas—as they undertake new immersive concert projects."

"This season, some of the most cutting-edge artists of our time will be invited to the Armory to illuminate complex histories, contemporary society, and visions of the future," said **Rebecca Robertson, Adam R. Flatto Founding President and Executive Producer of Park Avenue Armory**. "Within the historic architecture and massive scale of the Drill Hall, and with the collaboration of our partners, co-commissioners, and curators, their visions will unleash the fullest potential of what art can be and do."

The Armory's 2025 Wade Thompson Drill Hall programming begins in January with **Jamie xx**'s *In Waves*, a co-presentation with Bowery Presents that launches the North American tour for the artist's first solo album in 10 years. Returning to the Armory following his sold-out residency with The xx in 2014, Jamie xx will perform a career-spanning set with an emphasis on his newest album, *In Waves*, which captures the bliss, volatility, and introspection of a night out.

Revolutionary artist and activist **Yoko Ono** will bring the largest installation to date in North America of her ongoing work *Wish Tree* to the Armory in February. Featuring a grove of 92 trees installed in the Wade Thompson Drill Hall to mark the artist's 92nd birthday, the work will invite visitors to write and attach wishes to the branches, creating a large-scale yet personal activation. Ono's work will be the topic of a two-day symposium as part of the Armory's Making Space series, which will emphasize her legacy of advancing female empowerment, creativity, and peace.

Multifaceted contemporary artist **Anne Imhof** will transform the Armory with her new performance piece **DOOM**. Working across painting, drawing, video, music, and sculpture, Imhof is best known for creating large-scale installations that meld various media, including endurance performance, to create singular compositions—one of which, *Faust*, received the Golden Lion at the 2017 Venice Biennale. Commissioned specifically for the Armory and curated by **Klaus Biesenbach**, *DOOM* marks Imhof's largest performative work to date and will take over the Drill Hall. This sequential, durational performance punctuated by dramatic tableaux vivants of performers, sound, and scenography, will invite audiences into a shared experience that juxtaposes apathy and anxiety with resistance and optimism.

One of the most original and influential photographers of the twentieth century, **Diane Arbus** captured the wide breadth of humanity in postwar America with iconic documentary-style photographs that continue to resonate with artists and viewers today. Following Arbus' death in 1971, a photographer and student of hers

Neil Selkirk began printing for the Arbus Estate and remains the only person authorized to create prints from her negatives. Presented at the Armory in its North American premiere, *Constellation* brings together all prints from the set of more than 450 that Selkirk produced—the largest and most complete assemblage of Arbus's work to date. Presented as an unconventional "constellation" of photographs, the exhibition invites visitors to wander freely among the works, revealing new connections between the images and highlighting the imperceptible architecture of chance, chaos, and exploration that underlies all creations.

Acclaimed choreographer, dancer, and Guggenheim Fellow **Trajal Harrell** will make his Armory debut with the North American premiere of *Monkey Off My Back or The Cat's Meow*, a hybrid work that channels dance, theater, and history through a fashion spectacle featuring a large cast of dancers and actors wearing more than 60 Harrell-designed looks. Staged on a Mondrian-esque colored grid spanning the length of the Drill Hall—and echoing the Armory's own history of hosting fashion shows—*Monkey Off My Back* juxtaposes everyday gestures and extravagant poses with historical and pop culture references, including political rhetoric drawing on the Declaration of Independence and its urgent calls for freedom, resulting in a parade of expressiveness that celebrates the imaginative and unifying power of art.

Maverick composer **Georg Friedrich Haas** will present the North American premiere of *11,000 Strings*, a continuation of the spatial music masterpieces that the Armory has presented within its massive 55,000-square-foot Drill Hall, including 2024's *Inside Light* and 2022's *Monochromatic Light (Afterlife)*, among others. For *11,000 Strings*, audiences will be surrounded by a ring of 50 micro-tuned pianos played simultaneously and amplified by soloist ensemble **Klangforum Wien** to create cascading sonic landscapes ranging from tenderly melodic to a thunderous roar. Pushing the sonic palette of a piano beyond traditional tonality by introducing all possible pitches, Haas's experimentalism seeks to explore new ways that humans can perceive sound, creating a wholly unexpected listening experience.

The 2025 season concludes with *The Faggots and Their Friends Between Revolutions*, a stage adaptation of Larry Mitchell and Neil Asta's 1977 cult manifesto which offers a radically reimagined history of the world told through fables and myths with a queer, anti-assimilationist lens. Composer Philip Venables and director Ted Huffman have taken Mitchell's original text and transformed it into a cabaret-like spectacle, drawing on theater, song, and dance traditions from Baroque to Broadway. The eclectic cast of performers eschews norms of gender and genre, continually swapping roles while weaving deeply personal stories of community and survival. Equally satirical and vulnerable, *The Faggots and Their Friends* is a kaleidoscopic celebration of queerness and a political manifesto that puts marginalized voices center-stage.

Throughout the year, the Armory will present intimate performances, lectures, artist talks, and educational programs in its exquisite period rooms. The Board of Officers Room offers a home for classical and contemporary concerts through the Armory's **Recital Series** with performances by award-winning baritone **Konstantin Krimmel** in his North American recital debut with pianist **Ammiel Bushakevitz**, soprano and Metropolitan Opera Lindemann Young Artist Program graduate **Erin Morley** with pianist **Gerald Martin Moore**, Samoan tenor **Pene Pati** with pianist **Ronny Michael Greenberg** in his North American solo recital debut, pianist and MacArthur 'Genius' Fellow **Jeremy Denk**, mezzo-soprano and two-time Grammy Award winner **Sasha Cooke** with pianist **Myra Huang**, and two-time Grammy Award winning ensemble, the **Attacca Quartet**.

The Veterans Room will continue to host the **Artists Studio**, curated by MacArthur Genius, Grammy-nominated jazz pianist **Jason Moran**. The 2025 Artists Studio offers imaginative performances from today's most creative voices who defy categorization and freely explore artistic forms. Programs will feature curator and composer **Robert Aiki Aubrey Lowe**, Swedish experimental vocalist **Sofia Jernberg** with special guests, solo performer and drummer **Guillermo E. Brown**, and Norwegian artist and musician **Sandra Mujinga**.

The Armory will also present **Making Space** at the Armory, its public programming series of talks, salons, symposia, performances, and other programming that sparks conversation on contemporary issues with today's leading artists, activists, cultural leaders, scholars, and audiences. For its fourth season, Armory Curator of Public Programming and Guggenheim fellow **Tavia Nyong'o** will host the series focusing on the connections between art and civic life in our current moment. In addition to a two-day symposium that explores the legacy of multidisciplinary artist and activist **Yoko Ono**, programming includes a night of chamber music composed by **Brent Michael Davids** that chronicles the 400th anniversary of the origins of New Amsterdam and the enduring presence of the Lenape and additional Indigenous peoples; a panel discussion celebrating the legacy of *Vogue* editor and creative icon **Andre Leon Talley** led by thought leaders in the fashion industry that explores fashion's role in self-expression, cultural preservation, and resistance; a collective conversation with Black theater makers that manifests the influence and importance of Black theaters across the country; and additional dialogues with artists **Anne Imhof**, **Trajal Harrell**, **Georg Friedrich Haas**, **Philip Venables**, and **Ted Huffman**.

A British composer, DJ, musician, producer, and artist, **Jamie xx** is a lauded solo artist and sought-after remixer producing songs for renowned artists including Radiohead, Adele, Tyler the Creator, Drake, and Alicia Keys. Jamie xx is one third of the Mercury Prize-winning group The xx, whose unique blend of atmospheric indie pop, R&B, and electronic helped shape the sound of the 2010s. Known for this ability to manipulate tempo, rhythm and pitch while swiftly cutting between sub-genres and decades, Jamie xx's kinetic, euphoric, and atmospheric live sets are equally innovative and evocative, displaying a reverence for dance music's power to move bodies and emotions.

Jamie returns to the Armory to kick off the North American tour of *In Waves* following his unforgettable residency with The xx in 2014 after 25 sell-out performances. His four-night, back-to-back residency in the Wade Thompson Drill Hall will feature a career spanning set including his early solo 12" singles and music from his 2015 Grammy, Brit, Ivor Novello, and Mercury Prize-nominated debut album *In Colour* as well as his latest album *In Waves*, a paradise of bliss, heartbreak, and introspection that replicates the emotional crescendos of a mystical night out at the club.

Yoko Ono February 14 – 17

Yoko Ono is a groundbreaking and influential artist and activist, with a multidisciplinary career spanning conceptual art, film, and performance. A trailblazer of participatory work, a celebrated musician, and a formidable campaigner for world peace, her practice centers on ideas over objects, often expressed in poetic, humorous, profound, and radical ways.

Her powerful, participatory work is realized at the Armory with the largest installation to date in North America of her ongoing work *Wish Tree*. Within the Wade Thompson Drill Hall, a grove of 92 trees will be installed in celebration of the Ono's 92nd birthday. Visitors are invited to contribute to the installation by tying personal wishes to the trees, creating a large-scale yet intimate activation of her social practice work.

The installation also intersects with the Armory's Making Space series of public programs with a two-day symposium of conversations, panels, and activations that trace Ono's radical approach to art, language, and participation while amplifying her legacy of peace activism, creativity, and female empowerment.

Anne Imhof has emerged over the past decade as one of the most acclaimed contemporary artists of her generation. While working prolifically across painting, drawing, video, music, and sculpture, she is best known as a world-builder and scene-setter creating large-scale endurance performances or *tableaux vivants* that unite these various media in singular compositions. After galvanizing the German pavilion with her exhibition and performance *Faust*, for which she was awarded the prestigious Golden Lion award at the 2017 Venice Biennale, the visual and performance artist has gone on to create exhibitions at the Tate Modern in London and Palais de Tokyo in Paris that received acclaim from critics and viewers alike while landing her at the top of *ArtReview's* "Power 100" list and on the *Financial Times* list of the "25 Most Influential Women." The radical art world superstar takes hold of the entirety of the Armory for her largest performative work to date.

Utilizing the Wade Thompson Drill Hall, this all-encompassing work fuses space, performers, sound, and scenography in response to our present in which anxiety and hope find a fragile balance between apathy, activism, and resistance. This sequential durational performance takes audiences on a journey to ultimately find a sense of community through our own shared experiences. The culminating happening serves as a seismographic meter of our times, while projecting into our own possible futures to find a new form of hope.

Diane Arbus is one of the most original and influential photographers of the twentieth century, best known for her stark, documentary style of capturing people outside the boundaries of ordinary society. For decades, her innovative artistry has influenced countless artists with iconic images that seem to reflect Arbus's restless attraction to the unfamiliar in all its guises.

These dynamic pictures are given an evocative new life at the Armory in an immersive installation that brings together all of the photographs (some still unpublished) from the set of more than 450 prints produced by **Neil Selkirk**, a photographer and student of hers and the only person authorized to make prints from her negatives. This unconventional constellation of images allows viewers to find their own path to discover what lies between the pictures, what connects them to each other, and the imperceptible architecture underlying all creations: chance, chaos, and exploration. Marking the largest and most complete showing of her works in New York to date, this unprecedented collection of Arbus's works provides a diverse and singularly compelling portrait of humanity.

MONKEY OFF MY BACK OR THE CAT'S MEOW

Trajal Harrell Zürich Dance Ensemble September 9 – 20

Acclaimed choreographer, dancer, and Guggenheim fellow **Trajal Harrell** has made a name for himself as one of the most important creators working today by generating captivating hybrid works rooted in art and dance history that reimagine our pasts and create spaces for different eras and philosophies to converge. By deftly interfacing the glorious pageantry and elaborate flourishes of the New York voguing scene and the guttural passion of the Japanese dance form butoh with modern and post-modern dance vocabulary, he has created a signature style that is both transcultural and futuristic with wide-ranging references and humor. The internationally admired and respected artist comes to the Armory for the North American premiere of his latest creation that lies at the intersection of dance, theater, history, fashion, and music.

This parade of expressiveness is an homage to art as a free space for play and imagination, featuring a large cast that serves as dancers and actors wearing more than 60 virtuosic looks designed by Harrell. Centered on a stunning Mondrian-like colored grid spanning the length of the performance area, this dancing runway show is turned on its head with iconography that juxtaposes everyday gestures and extravagant poses with historical references, pop culture, and political rhetoric. And while drawing on the Declaration of Independence as a foundation for the US and its urgent call for freedom, this vivid mosaic of a double-edged paradigm also explores the resulting inequalities to the forebearers of the land affected by those actions while celebrating the unifying power of community.

The modern piano is a keyboard instrument with 88 black and white keys, producing 88 distinctive notes when played by a pianist. But what happens when a composer wants to expand that sonic palette when creating new work? That exact dilemma is tackled head-on by maverick composer **Georg Friedrich Haas** in his latest composition, which is performed at the Armory in its highly anticipated North American premiere.

This sonically adventurous spatial work is realized as a concert installation in the Wade Thompson Drill Hall, where the audience is surrounded by a chamber orchestra and 50 micro-tuned pianos. Each upright piano is tuned in the smallest of increments—the amount of difference between sounds that is audible to humans—to allow all pitches to be possible. And when paired with the phenomenal musicians of the **Klangforum Wien** as an acoustic amplifier, this ambitious new composition creates an immersive sound world that envelops listeners in a variety of sonic environments, from chillingly tender melodic motifs to the thunderous roar of a looming weather storm. This unforgettable experience showcases Haas' focus on the human dimension in his experimentalism while creating a new way of listening.

"It's been a long time since the last revolutions and the faggots and their friends are still not free." Published in 1977, this passage from **Larry Mitchell** and **Ned Asta**'s *The Faggots and Their Friends Between Revolutions* sets the scene for a radically reimagined history of the world told through a queer lens where fantasy meets liberation. Having become unavailable and reissued on the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of the Stonewall riots because of its enduring relevance, this cult book of fables and myths serves as the starting point for a new music theater adaptation from the creative minds of composer **Philip Venables** and director **Ted Huffman**.

Together they conjure up a world that takes the original text on a kaleidoscopic journey that ignores boundaries just like the characters on stage do, drawing on theater, dance, and song from the Baroque to Broadway and beyond. The performers serve as actors, storytellers, and musicians all rolled into one, continually swapping roles while doing away with gender and genre norms and replacing them with unapologetic individuality and a lust for life. Their deeply personal stories prove both comforting and healing when shared through community in a colorful, eclectic, and profound patchwork. The resulting cabaret-like spectacle is both vulnerable and daring, a fantastic parable hiding a political manifesto for survival that gives voice to the marginalized and oppressed everywhere.

One of today's most sought-after lyric coloratura sopranos, Erin Morley has stepped into the international spotlight with a string of critically acclaimed appearances in the great opera houses of the world. Tiffany & Co., Associated Artists—these interventions expressly mirror the innovative spirit of the exceptional young artists present at the room's inception.

Robert Aiki Aubrey Lowe

Adventurous artist, curator, and composer **Robert Aiki Aubrey Lowe** creates hypnotic sound worlds that blur the boundaries between live performance and installation. Inspired by civil rights legend Grace Lee Boggs's famous question—"What Time is it on the Clock of the World?"—this season invites audiences to become active participants in the conversations and connections that weave art into the texture of civic life in our current moment.

ABOUT PARK AVENUE ARMORY

Across its grand and intimate spaces, the Armory enables a diverse range of artists to create, students to explore, and audiences to experience epic, adventurous, relevant work that cannot be done elsewhere in New York.

The Armory both commissions and presents performances and installations in the grand Drill Hall and offers more intimate programming through its acclaimed Recital Series, which showcases musical talent from across the globe within the salon setting of the Board of Officers Room; its Artists Studio series curated by Jason Moran in the restored Veterans Room; Making Space at the Armory, a public programming series that brings together a discipline-spanning group of artists and cultural thought-leaders around the important issues of our time; and the Malkin Lecture Series that features presentations by scholars and writers on topics related to the Armory and its history. In addition, the Armory also has a year-round Artists-in-Residence program, providing space and support for artists to create new work and expand their practices.
